



Michael Banwell is an accomplished sculptor, installation artist and community activist who (much to the horror of die-hard formalists) provokes us to think about social and political issues.

A long-time resident of Strathcona, he has created temporary public art works for that neighborhood, some of them addressing architectural heritage, urban land use, shelter, public safety, prostitution and the drug trade.

More recently, Banwell has broached the subject of the cultural uses of wilderness.

Development and Desire, his mixed-media installation at the Or Gallery (412 West Hastings, until Feb. 12), takes the form of a generic "administrator's office."

Faux oak paneling and recorded bird songs; backlit wilderness photos and a handsome rowboat (it hangs overhead, as if we were looking at it from the bottom of a bureaucratic pond); glossy maps and a black desk spread with publications from a variety of government, forest industry and environmental sources — all these suggest various ways in which we construct a sense of the natural world and our place within it.

The wonderful thing about Banwell's installation is that he doesn't load the polemical dice in favor of one position or another. Represented here are all views, from the "for profit" intentions of industry through environmentalist commitment to conservation and recreationalist devotion to idyllic pleasures.

Still, we can guess where Banwell's sympathies lie by simply contrasting the love with which the beautiful green rowboat has been made with the synthetic awfulness of the office furniture and paneling.

There's irony, too, in this subtly conceived and impeccably executed installation — since real

wood (from real forests) is so much more delightful than fibreglass or plastic. ♦
